# ONLINE DATABASE FOR MONITORING AND REPORTING

EAPPI has developed an online database for monitoring and reporting, which EAs use to report incidents of human rights violations and children's rights violations.

Here, the EAs enter their observations after monitoring for example military check points or Palestinian schools.

The database is also used for statistical purpose.

The incidents that are reported in the database are shared with Save the Children, UNICEF and other international NGOs that advocate for children's rights in Israel and Palestine.



An important part of the reporting is to classify the type of violation. Typical examples could be:

- The arrest or detention of children on their way to school
- Military use or bombing of schools
- Or children harassed at military checkpoints.

Violations of International Humanitarian Law and International Human Rights Law are also registered during the reporting.

In the case of arrest or detention, the applicable documents would usually be:
